Quick Review

Adverb: A word that tells us more about a verb, adjective, or another adverb. It can tell **how**, **when**, **where**, or **how often** something happens.

Examples: The boy ran **quickly**. We arrived **early**. She looked **everywhere**.

Degrees of adverbs: We can compare the intensity of an action using three degrees: **Positive** (fast), **Comparative** (faster), and **Superlative** (fastest).

For many adverbs ending in *-ly*, use **more** and **most**: carefully → more carefully → most carefully.
